A Song of Trust: You Prepare a Table (Ps. 23:5)

From Shepherd to Host

- Up to this point, David has used shepherding imagery to describe His relationship with the LORD
- Now he shifts to an image of a <u>banquet</u>
 With the LORD acting as a gracious <u>host</u>
- This may seem sudden, but David's focus is still on the LORD who provides, leads, & protects

You Prepare a Table

• The LORD welcomes us to <u>dine</u> and <u>fellowship</u> with Him oInviting someone to dine together has always been a sign of <u>acceptance</u> and <u>love</u>

In the Presence of My Enemies

- The image is not of some future hope where all conflict is put to rest
 oIt is an image of our <u>current</u> standing with the God as our <u>Shepherd</u>
- We have a personal <u>peace</u>, even in the midst of <u>struggles</u> with others oWhich is centered in our <u>relationship</u> with the LORD
- However, when you dine with others, it gives opportunity to build <u>relationships</u> oPossibly turning enemies into <u>friends</u>
 - oThus, this may also serve as a symbol of God's desire to bring <u>peace</u> between us and others (Matt. 5:9; Rom. 12:18)

You Anoint My Head

- Fragrant oil was used to wash the heads of guests as they entered one's home oIt was a sign of <u>blessing</u> and <u>welcoming</u>
- God's anointing rests on us who He has welcomed into His presence through Jesus
- Our Good Shepherd, Jesus, anoints us with His Holy Spirit
- oThe presence of the Spirit is connected to anointing with oil all throughout Scripture (Ex. 27:20-21, Lev 8:30; 14:1-18; 1 Sam 16:13; Ps. 45:7; 89:20; Ezek. 16:9; Mark 16:3; James 5:14; Isa. 61:1; cf. Luke 4:18; Heb. 1:9)

My Cup Overflows

- David declares that in God's presence, his cup <u>overflows</u>
 oIt is a declaration of the abundance of <u>blessings</u> received from the LORD
 oAnd if it is overflowing, then we have blessings to <u>share</u>
- A guest's cup fullness is an indication of the desire of the host to have them <u>stay</u>
 oIf your cup is empty, it is time to <u>go</u>
 oAn overflowing cup means that the LORD desires for us to <u>stay</u> with Him <u>forever</u>

So What?

- Do we know this deep fellowship with the LORD available through Jesus with the blessings of His Spirit's presence with us always?
- Are we sharing those blessings from our overflowing cup?
