# A Song of Trust: I Shall Dwell (Ps. 23:6)

### Goodness and Mercy

• David concludes the Psalm by describing the <u>results</u> of his relationship with God o <u>Goodness</u> (tov): The blessings that God bestows upon those who seek Him o <u>Mercy</u> (hesed): The loving kindness and favor of God

### Twin Paths

- The language here can have two distinct meanings, both of which are viable and supported elsewhere in Scripture
- They differ based on the meaning of two phrases
  - o"Shall follow me":
    - To <u>pursue/chase</u> after
      - As one who is being <u>hunted</u> (see Ex. 21:13-14; Duet. 19:6)
      - Normally used <u>negatively</u>
    - To follow behind
      - That which is left in one's wake (Deut. 16:20; Jdg. 3:28; Ps. 34:14)
      - A more positive connotation
  - o"The House of the LORD":
    - The <u>Tabernacle/Temple</u>
      - Earthly place of worship where God's presence was thought to dwell among His people
    - <u>Heaven</u>
      - The eternal abode of God, not accessible to humans before death/resurrection
- So, David is saying:
  - oGod's goodness & mercy drive him into the Tabernacle to thank God again and again
    - The focus on repeated <u>thanksgiving</u>
    - oGoodness & mercy <u>follow</u> after him as the result of his <u>relationship</u> with God, until his days end and he spends <u>eternity</u> with God
      - The focus on the <u>impact</u> he has on others
- These are not mutually exclusive
  - OIt is the dual meaning of the overflowing cup
    - <u>Permanence</u> in God's <u>presence</u>
    - Overflowing <u>blessings</u> to <u>others</u>

#### I Shall Dwell

- The result is not a <u>one-time</u> event, but a <u>continual</u> relationship oDwell: to <u>abide</u> or stay <u>permanently</u>
- God's house has become <u>David's</u> house too
   "All the days of my life" have become "<u>forever</u>"
- For us, the Temple is not a place, but God's people (1 Cor. 3:16; Eph. 2:19-22)
- God dwells in us through His Spirit
  - oThus, we are with Him <u>forever</u>, not just after <u>death</u>
  - o<u>Eternal life</u> begins the moment we come to know Jesus, or Good Shepherd (John 5:24; 6:47; 1 John 5:13)

## So What?

Are we trusting Jesus to be our Good Shepherd?
To provide, lead, protect, and bless us
To welcome us in and give us a permanent place at His side
