The Gospel of John: The Call to Follow

John 1:35-51

Come & See (1:34-39)

- When the Baptizer sees Jesus the next day, he points Him out to two of his <u>disciples</u> oThe Baptizer again uses the title <u>Lamb</u> of <u>God</u> to refer to Jesus (see Isa 53:7) oDisciple (*mathātās*): one who engages in <u>learning</u> through <u>instruction</u> from another
 - It was common practice for rabbis to have young men seek them out
 - John the Baptizer had disciples of his own
- They refer to Jesus as "Rabbi"
 An Aramaic word which means religious teacher
- The Baptizer's disciples become Jesus' when He invites them to come & see

Andrew & Simon (v. 40-42)

- Andrew, one of the Baptizer's disciples, tells his brother <u>Simon</u> that he has found the Messiah in Jesus
 - oMessiah/Christ: The anointed one
 - The promised <u>Davidic King</u> who would establish the <u>Kingdom</u> of <u>God</u>
- When Jesus meets Simon, He nicknames him
 Cephas (Aramaic)/Peter (Greek): <u>Rock</u>

Philip & Nathanael (v. 43-51)

- Jesus & the 3 disciples leave for Galilee, where they meet Philip, whom He invites to follow Him
- Philip goes to find his friend Nathanael
 - oLikely the same disciple listed as Bartholomew ("son of Tholomaeus") in the Synoptics, who all link him with Philip (Mt 10:3; Mk 3:18; Lk 6:14)
- Philip tells him that Jesus is the one to whom all the <u>Scriptures</u> point (see John 5:39)
- Nathanael is skeptical because of Jesus' <u>hometown</u>
 But Philip invites Nathanael to "<u>Come</u> and <u>see</u>," thus doing what <u>Jesus</u> does
- When Jesus sees Nathanael, claiming that he is without <u>deceit</u>
 OWilling to examine for himself the claims being made about Jesus to make his own assessment
- When asked how He knows Nathanael, Jesus replies that He saw him <u>supernaturally</u> before Philip even approached
 - oThis was enough evidence for Nathanael to call Him
 - Son of God/King of Israel: Both titles refer to Jesus as <u>Messiah</u>
- Jesus promises that He will show them all greater things oCiting the vision of <u>Jacob's ladder</u> (Gen 28:12)
 - This is when God confirmed that He was expanding His covenant with Abraham to Jacob
 - Later, Jacob ("deceiver") has his name changed to Israel ("the man who contends with/sees God")
- Jesus is showing them that He has come to be true <u>Israel</u>
 OHis words to Nathanael (v. 47) take on deeper meaning too

■ Those who follow Jesus will be a part of this true Israel
