The Story behind the Song

- The song was originally a Negro Spiritual oSongs sung by slaves as they worked in the fields & worshipped together
- It was put in a collection by John Wesley Work, Jr. in 1907

The Meaning of the Song

- The song is a retelling of the Nativity story, with each stanza advancing the story: • The <u>angels</u> appearing to the <u>shepherds</u> (Luke 2:8-9) • The announcement of the birth of the <u>Savior</u> (Luke 2:10-14) • The manager holding Christ, the bringer of selection (Luke 2:15, 16)
- The manger holding Christ, the bringer of salvation (Luke 2:15-16)
- The refrain is centered on the response of the <u>shepherds</u> to finding the baby Jesus (Luke 2:17-18) • They told whoever would listen about this <u>newborn King</u>

The Message of Christmas

- As much as the message of Christmas is about Jesus being born, it is also a reminder of <u>why</u> He was born
- He came to <u>save</u> us

• That is not a message for a single day or even season of the year • That is a message that is constantly needed to be heard

- The message of the <u>manger</u> is the message of the <u>Cross</u>
- And we are called to proclaim this <u>Good News</u> of Jesus to whoever will listen (Mark 16:15) oJust like those <u>shepherds</u>

So What?

- Do we know Jesus as Savior?
- Are we proclaiming Him to all who will listen?
