Acts: The Journey to Jerusalem

(Acts 21:1-16)

To Tyre (v. 1-6)

- After Paul parted ways with the Ephesian Elders in Miletus, he and his companions board a ship and sail to the island of Kos, then Rhodes, and switch vessels in Patara to travel <u>400</u> miles across open water to the Syrophoenician city of <u>Tyre</u>
- Paul & company stay with Christian community there for a week
 - o<u>Jesus</u> had visited this city & healed a demon-possessed girl because of her mother's faith (Mark 7:24-30)
 - o And there had been missionary activity in the region (Acts 11:19; 15:3)
- While there, the Holy Spirit reveals imminent <u>danger</u> awaits Paul if he returns to Jerusalem oThe warning of danger was from the <u>Spirit</u>
 - The urging to avoid it was from the Christians there
- After warm farewells, the party continues their journey

Words of Warning (v. 7-14)

- Next, they head to <u>Ptolemais/Acco</u> where they visit with the Church for a day
- Then they travel to the administrative hub of Judea & the port for Jerusalem, <u>Caesarea</u> oThey stay with <u>Philip</u> the <u>Evangelist</u>, one of the 7 deacons mentioned in Acts 8:40 oAnd his 4 daughters, who are described as <u>unmarried</u> & having the gift of <u>prophecy</u>
- While there, Paul is visited by <u>Agabus</u>, a Judean prophet
 OHe uses a prophetic <u>type-act</u> to foretell what awaits Paul in Jerusalem
 - Betrayal by his Jewish brethren & arrest by the Romans
 - The implication is that Paul will suffer like <u>Jesus</u> & some of the other <u>Apostles</u> had
- Luke & the others beg Paul not to go to Jerusalem
- Paul's response:
 - ODon't <u>cry</u> or try to <u>talk</u> <u>me</u> <u>out</u> of this
 - oI am ready to be <u>arrested</u> & even <u>die</u> for Jesus!
 - This is what the Holy Spirit has been preparing him for
- Finally, they <u>consent</u>: 'The Lord's will be done.' (v. 14)
 - oWhat they don't understand is that everything that is about to happen to Paul will give him opportunity to share Jesus with <u>people</u> and in <u>places</u> he never could otherwise
 - oIt was God's will for him to be arrested

Full Circle (v. 15-16)

- Paul & company leave and make their last stop at the home of Mnason, a <u>Cyprian</u> Christian oHe is described as an early convert & may have come to know Jesus because of Paul's preaching on his <u>first</u> missionary journey (Acts 13:4ff)
 - OPossibly a symbol of Paul's ministry coming full circle

So What?

- Paul was willing to undergo arrest and even death so others would come to know Jesus oHe was not the first Christian nor the last to do so
- Do we have that kind of resolve to share Jesus?

Meditation Verse: Philippians 1:21-22a
