# The Gospel of John: Betrayals & Love

John 13:18-38

#### Prediction & Mission (v. 18-20)

- Jesus has told the disciples that they will be blessed if they sacrificial serve one another (v. 17)
- Now He clarifies that this does not pertain to all of them because someone will <u>betray</u> Him oThough He doesn't state this plainly at first
- He quotes <u>David's</u> words from Ps 41:9 • This prediction is meant to strengthen their <u>faith</u> in Him
- He asserts that to believe in Him is to believe in the One who sent Him (His <u>Father</u>) • And likewise, to believe the ones Jesus will send out (the <u>disciples</u>) is to believe in Him • Jesus' <u>mission</u> will continue even after the Cross through His <u>disciples</u>, including <u>us</u>

## Betrayal by Action (v. 21-30)

- Jesus then tells them plainly that one of them is going to betray Him
- They don't know who it is • Peter asks the 'beloved' disciple next to Jesus to clarify who He means
- Jesus discreetly informs John that the betrayer is the disciple with whom He shares a piece of bread

oEven though Judas is about to betray Him, Jesus treats him with love and courtesy

- At this moment, <u>Satan</u> takes possession of Judas • This does not imply that Judas had no choice in this event • Satan utilized Judas' good intention
  - Most evil acts are done by people who think they're doing something 'good'
- Jesus tells Judas/Satan to get on with his plan immediately oJudas leaves to tell the <u>High Priest's guards</u> where they can find Jesus

# A New Command (v. 31-35)

- Jesus states that His <u>glorification</u> has come oHis <u>death</u> via <u>crucifixion</u>
- oSomewhere they cannot follow now
- He will then leave His disciples to continue His mission by following His example
- The mark of <u>true</u> disciples is whether they <u>love</u> each other as He has <u>loved</u> them oGod has always commanded <u>love</u> (Dt 6:5, Lev 19:18)
  What makes it a *new* command is that Jesus sets the <u>standard</u> for how we are to love

## Betrayal by Disowning (v. 36-38)

- In ignorance & impulsiveness, Peter insists that he will follow Jesus wherever He goes
- Jesus tells Peter he will follow the path of Jesus later • Peter will later <u>die</u> like Jesus
- But Peter will first <u>disown</u> Jesus three times oA <u>betrayal</u> of his own
- •In fact, all the disciples will flee that very night
- Jesus does not tell Peter this to shame him but to <u>humble</u> him oJesus later <u>forgives</u> Peter for his betrayal

#### So What?

- Jesus forgives us when we fail • Are we seeking His forgiveness?
- Jesus commands us to continue His mission • Are we living out His mission by loving others as He loves us, both in word & deed?
