Teach Us to Pray: "Our Father"

Matthew 6:9

Content vs. Words (v. 9a)

- After Jesus addresses the <u>attitudes</u> & <u>pitfalls</u> of human-centered prayer (v. 6-8), He moves to the <u>content</u> of our prayers
- He starts with the remark, "This is how you should pray"
- oWhat follows are not *necessarily* the words we need to <u>recite</u> but rather the <u>content</u> that prayer should <u>focus</u> on

Our Intimate Audience (v. 9b)

- Jesus begins by invoking God as "our Father,"
- The idea of God as the Father is mentioned in the Old Testament, though rarely (15x) • To the <u>nation</u> of <u>Israel</u> (Deut. 32:6; Isa. 63:16 [2x]; 64:8; Jer. 3:4, 19; 31:9; Mal. 1:6; 2:10) • To the <u>Davidic king</u> (2 Sam. 7:14; 1 Chron. 17:13; 22:10; 28:6; Ps. 68:5; 89:26) • And arguably never in <u>direct prayer</u>
- However, calling God "Father" is Jesus' preferred term
 And not just for Himself, He is "our Father"
 He refers to God as "<u>your</u> Father" 14 times in the Sermon on the Mount alone (Matt 5:16, 45, 48; 6:1, 4, 6, 8, 14, 15, 18, 26, 32; 7:11, 21)
- "Father" is a term of <u>intimacy</u> • We pray to a God who <u>knows</u> us and who we <u>know</u>
- And yet, He is "the one who is in heaven" • Our Father is the <u>transcendent</u> God of the universe • He is <u>all-powerful</u> and <u>all-knowing</u>

Our First Focus (v. 9c)

- The phrase "Hallowed be Your Name" is a passive imperative oMeaning it is a declaration of a <u>wish</u> or <u>desire</u>
 - "May it be holy"
- A name in the ancient world was a way of not only <u>identifying</u> someone but also describing their <u>attributes</u>

oHoly: To be set apart/special

- This is not a petition that seeks for God to show off His power, but rather that there is a <u>recognition</u> and <u>reverence</u> for His holiness throughout creation
- This starts with *us* <u>reflecting</u> His holiness to the world • This is not a request for God to do something <u>for</u> us, but rather that He do something <u>through</u> us

So What?

- Do we approach God as our heavenly Father?
- Do we desire to make Him know as holy?
