James: The Two Paths

James 1:9-16

Wealth & Poverty (v. 9-12)

- James addresses two groups & their attitudes:
 - oThe 'poor': Those disregarded by the world
 - oThe 'rich': Those deemed successful by the world's standards
 - oBoth should take an eternal perspective
- The poor should take <u>pride</u> because they have been <u>exalted</u> in Christ (Matt 5:3) oThough we often think of pride/boasting as sinful, it depends on its <u>source</u> (Jer 9:23-24)
- The rich should remember that their wealth is <u>fleeting</u>, like <u>flowers</u>

 The rich Christian should boast in the <u>humiliation</u> that they may experience from the world when they are associated with <u>Christ</u>
- Thus, both the poor & rich Christian have the same focus & hope: <u>Jesus</u>
- Enduring the world's <u>ridicule</u> for the hope of Jesus is part of the trials that are rewarded with the crown of life (v. 12)

The Two Paths of Temptation (v. 13-18)

- James clarifies that the source of <u>trials/temptations</u>* is not God o God is not tempted, nor does He tempt o Temptation is rooted in our own <u>desires</u>
- When we are tempted, it is like two paths set before us • We either give in to the temptation, which leads to sin & death • Or we turn to the Lord, which leads to strength, wisdom, & life
- Temptation is a form of <u>deception</u> • When we believe that we can find what we need in a source other than God
- The truth is that everything good comes from our <u>heavenly Father</u> oStarting with the new <u>life</u> He offers us in Christ

So What?

- What path are we walking?
 - oThe one that indulges temptation and leads to death
 - OOr the one that we walk with Jesus, who gives us strength, wisdom, and life
