# The Gospel of John: The True Vine

John 15:1-25

#### The Vine & Branches (v. 1-8)

- After Jesus has left the upper room in Jerusalem, He leads His disciples toward the Garden of Gethsemane through the vineyards and orchards on the outskirts of the city
- He uses His surroundings to teach, calling on the OT imagery of <u>vines</u> which were repeatedly to correct a <u>fruitless Israel</u> (Ps 80:9–16; Is 5:1–7; 27:2ff.; Jer 2:21; 12:10ff.; Ezk 15:1–8; 17:1–21; 19:10–14; Hos 10:1–2)

o Jesus is the true vine, the faithful incarnation of what Israel was intended to be

- The Father is the gardener who:
  - o <u>Prunes</u> the fruitful branches
  - Dealing with <u>sin</u> in us so we bear greater fruit
  - o Cuts off the fruitless branches
    - They are gathered and burned (v. 6)
      - This is who assume their status in God's people but show no evidence of it (Ezk 15:1-8)
- We are the <u>branches</u>, joining God's true <u>covenant</u> people through our connection to <u>Jesus</u> o Our job is to bear <u>fruit</u>, which is only possible when we *stay* connected to Jesus
  - Because it is His <u>Spirit's</u> work in us (Gal 5:22-23)

# Bearing Fruit (v. 9-17)

- The fruit that we are to bear is <u>demonstrated</u> for us by the Father & the Son • We are to <u>love</u> one another as God <u>loves</u> us
- Jesus clarifies that our status has changed from servants to friends
  - He demonstrates His friendship by:
    - He is including us in His plans
    - Laying down His life for us
  - •We demonstrate our friendship by obeying His command to love others like Him
  - o Jesus chooses us so that we can be fruitful for Him
- When we are part of Jesus' mission, we can <u>ask</u> for whatever we need for that mission, and He will <u>provide</u> it (v. 7, 16)

## In Good Company (v. 18-25)

- Jesus encourages us that if we <u>act</u> like He does, we should expect to be <u>treated</u> like He was o Being met with <u>hatred</u> & <u>persecution</u>
- Jesus shows the world God's <u>righteousness</u>
  - 0 Rejecting Him leaves the world stuck in their sin
  - Jesus cites <u>David's</u> words to connect this maltreatment with the <u>Messianic</u> mission (Ps 35:19; 69:4; 109:3)
- When we reflect Jesus to others, they may respond with <u>curiosity</u> or <u>contempt</u>

## So What?

- Are we staying connected to Jesus?
- Are we bearing the fruit by loving others like Jesus loves us?
- When mistreated for representing Christ, do we respond with anger, despair, or God-given joy?
