The Big Picture:

The Promise of Something New (Jeremiah 31:31-34)

From David to Jeremiah

- During David's lifetime there was turmoil in his family.
 - oAfter his death (c. 971 BC), his son Solomon took the throne, expanded the kingdom, and built the Temple in Jerusalem
- Solomon's unfaithfulness to God led to his kingdom undergoing civil war and being divided after his death (c. 931 BC)
 - ORehoboam, Solomon's son, ruled in Judah (south)
 - o Jeroboam I ruled in Israel (north)
- The Divided Kingdom
 - o Israel (North): 931-723 BC; Capitol: Samaria
 - 19 kings from various lines
 - Ended with the fall of Samaria to the Assyrians (c. 723 BC)
 - oJudah (South): 931-586 BC; Capitol: Jerusalem
 - 20 kings, all from David's line
 - Ended with the fall of Jerusalem to the Babylonians (c. 586 BC)
- Jeremiah was born during the end of the Assyrian reign in Judah (c. 650 BC)
 - OHe was a prophet to Judah, warning of coming judgment from God in the form of the Babylonian Empire
 - OInto the midst of this judgment, God spoke words of hope
 - oThey had abandoned Him, but He was still holding out His promise to redeem them
 - God promised to restore Israel (Jer. 31:1-22) and Judah (v. 23-26)
 - And then promised to bring about something new for both (v. 27-40)

Something New (v. 31-32)

- God declares that He will establish a new covenant with His people
- It will be like the old covenant
 - OA reference specifically to the Mosaic covenant
- The need for something new was not rooted in some failure on <u>God's</u> part, but rather a failure by the <u>people</u>
- God's been like a faithful <u>husband</u> to them
 They have been like an unfaithful <u>wife</u> (see Hosea)

Something Different (v. 33-34)

- The main difference between the Mosaic covenant and the new one will be the role of obedience
- The Law will move from an <u>external</u> code to an <u>internal</u> reality oPlaced upon the <u>heart</u> and <u>mind</u> by <u>God Himself</u>
- It will be marked by God's act of <u>forgiveness</u>
 For God to <u>dwell</u> within His people, their <u>sins</u> must be dealt with

The Need for Something New

- The Mosaic covenant put the onus of obedience upon the people, and they failed
 - OBut that was, in part, its purpose, to show us our <u>sinfulness</u> and inability to be <u>righteous</u> through our own striving (Rom 3:20)

- Instead, God promised to make a covenant where <u>obedience</u> is due to <u>God</u> at work in us o<u>Immanuel/God</u> with <u>us</u> theology
- This is accomplished through the work of <u>Jesus</u> and the indwelling of the <u>Holy Spirit</u> (Heb 9:15; Rom 8:1-4)

So What?

- Jesus is the one who allows us to be part of God's promises by dealing with our sins oDo we know Him and the forgiveness He offers?
- God's promise was to work in us to make us faithful to Him oAre we working with Him through His Spirit?
