Carols for the King: O Come, O Come Emmanuel

(Isaiah 7:1-14; Various Texts)

The Setting (v. 1-2)

- Ahaz is king of Judah (Southern Kingdom)
 From the line of <u>David</u>
 c. <u>735</u> BC
- Aram & Israel come to make war against Judah
- Ahaz & the Israelites fear for the safety of Jerusalem (v. 2b)

The Message (v. 3-9)

- <u>Isaiah</u> & his son go to meet Ahaz at the <u>Washer's Field</u> (v. 3) • Shear-Jashub: "A <u>remnant</u> will return" • Washer's Field: city <u>water</u> system
- The Lord assures Ahaz that his enemies will fail • As long as he <u>trusts</u> in the Lord (v. 9b)

The Sign (v. 10-14)

- The Lord tells Ahaz to ask for a sign of His faithfulness to His promise to David (2 Sam. 7:12-13)
- Ahaz feigns piety and refuses (v. 11-12)
- God scolds Ahaz and gives him a <u>double-edged</u> sign o<u>Immanuel</u>: "<u>God</u> [is] with us"

Immanuel (v. 14-17)

- A virgin will have a son: 2 fulfillments
- "This young woman": perhaps <u>Isaiah's</u> 2nd son (see Isa. 8)
 This child will act as a <u>reminder</u> that God is with us
 Immediate: <u>12-13</u> years later (v. 15-16)
 Result: <u>Aram & Israel</u> will be destroyed (c. <u>722</u> BC)
 - But at the hands of <u>Assyria</u>, who will subject <u>Judah</u>
 - oHowever, during the years that followed, especially when the Israelites were in exile in Babylon, they looked back on God's promise to David about an everlasting king

• "A *virgin*": A miracle

oThis child will <u>be</u> God with us

 $0\underline{700}$ + years later

- oResult: God becomes man (John 1:14)
- One meaning: God will keep His <u>promise</u> to David (Matt. 1:23) • A King will come to sit on the throne forever • And His name is <u>Iesus!</u>

So What?

- Jesus is God's gift of hope
- He is our constant reminder that God is with us
