Stewards of Grace

(Ephesians 3:1-13)

Paul's Ministry (v. 1-2)

- Paul asserts that we are "being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit" (2:22)
 - oThat is, Jews & Gentiles are being made into something new, a <u>united</u> people in whom God's <u>Spirit</u> dwells
- Paul's calling was to be a <u>steward</u> of God's <u>grace</u>
 - OSteward: one <u>responsible</u> for the <u>oversight</u> and <u>management</u> of someone else's belongings
 - OGrace: a free, unmerited gift
 - That which <u>saves</u> us (3:5a, 8a)
 - The <u>on-going</u> gift of God at work in us
 - It connects us to God and one another
 - It enlists us into His service
 - It <u>empowers</u> us to do what He calls us to

Mystery & Revelation (v. 3-7)

- Paul's ministry is marked by God's revelation of a <u>mystery</u>
 OMystery: That which was formerly <u>unknown</u> that has now been made know
- That mystery is the <u>Gospel</u> itself
 That God would <u>reconcile</u> people to Himself through the <u>sacrifice</u> of His Son,
 Jesus
- Part of this mystery is the Gentiles are now <u>co-heirs</u> with the Jews of God's promises through <u>Christ</u> (v. 6)
 - oWe are co-heirs because Jesus gives us freely what He has deserves as the <u>obedient</u> Son (2 Cor 1:20)
- And this mystery is now revealed to the world through the preaching of the Gospel

Stewards of Grace (v. 8-12)

- Paul reflects briefly on his inadequacies to be chosen for this mission (v. 8)
- But then shifts his focus to the mission itself: Displaying God's <u>wisdom</u> in the <u>redemptive</u> work of Jesus
 - oThrough whom we can approach the very <u>presence</u> of God with <u>confidence</u> (v. 12; Heb 4:16)
- This job belongs to the <u>Church</u> as a whole oLike Paul, we are called to <u>administer</u> God's grace to others oAll who <u>receive</u> grace are called to <u>give</u> grace (see 4:7; 1 Pet. 4:10)
- This serves as an <u>object</u> lesson for <u>spiritual beings</u> (v. 10c; 1 Pet 1:12)

Suffering for Love (v. 13)

- Paul was willing to be <u>imprisoned</u>, <u>beaten</u>, <u>stoned</u>, <u>starved</u>, <u>shipwrecked</u>, <u>ridiculed</u> and even <u>killed</u> so that the Gentiles could know the Good News about Jesus

 And he says that they are all <u>worth</u> it
 He wants this to be a point of <u>encouragement</u>, not dismay
- We often avoid <u>hardship</u>
 But sometimes the Gospel requires us to undergo it for the sake of others

So What?

- Are we revealing Christ to the world?
- Are we being good stewards of the grace of God to others?
- Are we willing to suffer hardship to do it?
