Ecclesiastes: Living with Purpose

A Time for Everything (Ecclesiastes 3)

On Time (v. 1-8)

- Solomon reflects on the ever-<u>changing</u> aspects of life
- Human life is ruled by <u>time</u>

 Always moving <u>forward</u>
 Bringing both good and <u>bad</u>
- We are not able to fully experience eternity yet
- Consider God's words to David concerning building the <u>Temple</u> (2 Sam 7:5-13) • Compared to Solomon's experience of building the <u>Temple</u> (2 Chron 2:5-6)
- God has His own <u>timing</u> • Ultimately, this was about <u>Jesus</u> building an <u>eternal household</u> for God • Something that Solomon could not <u>fathom</u>

Conclusions about Time (v. 9-14)

- Our entrapment in time is a reminder of our mortality (v.9)
- The fruit of our <u>labor</u> will not last (v. 10)
- But God makes everything work out for its <u>appropriate</u> season of life (v. 11a) • He is the <u>Lord</u> of <u>time</u> • And has made us long for a <u>timeless</u> reality with Him (v. 11b)
- These truths lead to the conclusion that we should learn to <u>enjoy</u> the life that God has given us oEven though this life is <u>transitory</u>
 - That means so is <u>pleasure</u>
 - And so is <u>pain</u>
- Only God is <u>eternal</u> • And what He does will be the only things that <u>last</u> • Which leads to <u>reverence</u> for God

On Justice (v. 15-17)

- Solomon turns his attention to justice and its lack in the world
- Justice is not done in this world • But God will assure that it will be done to and for all in <u>eternity</u>

On Death (v. 18-21)

- Solomon reflects on the <u>mortality</u> of all oBoth men and beasts
- Reminder: God has not clearly revealed the idea of <u>resurrection</u> at this time in redemptive history oYet there are hints even in Solomon's own assurance of eternal <u>justice</u>

Solomon's Conclusion (v. 22)

- If life is fleeting, we should enjoy the work set before us
- Yet, Solomon's perspective is limited • He asks who can know what comes after
 - Questioning if there is life after <u>death</u>

So What?

- Without the hope of resurrection, aspects of this life can seem empty
- But with the perspective that there is more than this life, all of this life can have meaning when our life is lived for God
- Are we living for God?
