The Triumphal Entry (Matthew 21:1-11)

The King on a Donkey (v. 1-7)

- Jesus enters Jerusalem with other Galilean pilgrims for the Passover Festival
- He sends for a <u>donkey foal</u> to ride into town on
 - This was an intentional act to signal both His <u>identity</u> and <u>mission</u> based on prophecy (Zec. 9:9)
 - ○His identity: Israel's promised king
 - The <u>Messiah/Christ</u>
 - ○His mission: To bring <u>righteousness</u> & <u>salvation</u> to his people
 - His means of accomplishing this mission is through ushering in <u>peace</u> (Zec. 9:10)
 - Which He will do through His covenantal sacrifice (Zec. 9:11)

The Royal Treatment (v. 8-9)

- As Jesus was riding on his 'royal steed,' the crowds <u>recognized</u> Him and <u>called</u> <u>others</u> to come out to meet Him
 - \circ They used language indicating that the thought that He as the promised <u>Messiah</u> (v. 9)
 - Luke translates this for his <u>Gentile</u> readers (Luke 19:38)
- Those who had seen His raising of <u>Lazarus</u> told others of what He had done (John 12:17-18) *Identity Issues (v. 10-11)*
- Despite this royal entrance, people still don't know who Jesus is
 Some seeing Him merely as a prophet
- But Israelites don't give prophets <u>parades</u>
 They typically <u>killed</u> them
- Many within the crowd that welcomed Him as the promised Messiah would, within a few days, call for His <u>execution</u>

So What?

- Who is Jesus for us? oIs He king?
- Are we making that know to the world?
 Like the prophecies, the crowds, and even the donkey
