James: An Introduction to Wisdom (James 1:1)

Wisdom & Faith

- The Bible is filled with words of wisdom
 - oWisdom: To live life with God as our focus (Pro 9:10)
 - It is putting our <u>faith</u> in God into <u>action</u>
- There 5 OT books that are Wisdom Literature
 - o<u>Job</u>
 - o<u>Psal</u>ms
 - o Proverbs
 - o Ecclesiastes
 - OSong of Songs
- The book of James is often called the NT's Wisdom Literature
 - oTwo of the main themes of the book of James are wisdom and faith
 - Taking the truth of <u>Jesus</u>' teachings and applying them to life
 - There are many parallels between this book and Jesus' <u>Sermon</u> on the <u>Mount</u> (Matt 5-7)
- Wisdom throughout James is spoken of in the same way that the <u>Holy Spirit</u> is throughout the rest of Scripture (cf. Jas 3:13-17; Gal 5:13-26)
 - oThis is because living out godly wisdom requires the Holy Spirit's aid

The Form & Place in the Canon

- This book is written as a <u>letter</u> to a <u>wide</u> audience oThough it reads like a sermon
- It is part of the section of the New Testament called the General Epistles:
 - o<u>James</u> (faith)
 - 01 & 2 Peter (hope)
 - 01, 2, & 3 John (love)
 - 0<u>Jude</u>

The Author (v. 1a)

- The <u>half-brother</u> of Jesus (Matt 13:55)
- Originally a skeptic of Jesus' Messiahship (John 7:5)
- But he put his <u>faith</u> in Jesus shortly *after* the resurrection (Acts 1:14)
- He became a central <u>leader</u> in the early Church oThe style of James is reflective of the letter from the <u>Jerusalem Council</u> (Acts 15:23-29)
- However, notice that James introduces himself as a <u>servant</u> of Jesus, not His brother oJames understood his place
 - oBiology does not determine one's place in God's family; real faith does (Matt 12:46-50)

The Audience (v. 1b)

- "The twelve tribes scattered among the nations" o<u>Jewish</u> Christians
- This is one of the earliest books of the NT (c. AD 45-48)

oPossibly written after the <u>dispersion</u> of Christian Jews from Jerusalem following the <u>martyrdom</u> of Stephen (Acts 7-8)

The Purpose

- James wrote to instruct these Christians on how to live out their new <u>faith</u> in Jesus, even amid <u>hardships</u>
- The first chapter lays out the themes that will be expanded on later in the letter
 - oTrials & temptations (1:2-4, 12-15; 5:7-11)
 - oWisdom & faith (1:5-8, 16-18; 3:13-4:10)
 - oRich & poor (1:9-11; 2:1-13; 4:13-17; 5:1-6)
 - oFaith & deeds (1:19-25; 2:14-26; 4:11-12; 5:12)
 - oTaming the tongue (1:26-27; 3:1-12)
