Jesus, Our Peace

Matthew 4:13-16; Isaiah 9:1-7

Looking Back

- Galilee considered "back water" (John 1:46)
- The Jews were under Roman control
 - OHerod the Great was a regional "king"
 - Galilee was a disputed territory
- There was no peace
- When Messiah came, He was to bring peace (v. 4b-5)
 - This was understood as freedom from oppression
 - ○Peace = No <u>War</u>

Looking to His Birth

- The pronouncement at Jesus' birth was that He came to bring peace (Luke 2:14)
- Did Jesus bring peace with His birth? (Matt 10:34)
 - OJesus never ended a war between two <u>nations</u>

Right Now

- Peace means no conflict with <u>God</u> (Rom 5:1)
 - o Peace does not mean no conflict in the world (Rom. 6:20a)
- Instead, Jesus offers us peace in the midst of the <u>chaos</u> of this world (John 14:27; Phil. 4:7)

Looking Forward

- When Christ returns, He will end all <u>conflicts</u>

 Dut through war first.
 - OBut through war first
- He will then reign on Earth (Isa. 9:7)

So What?

- Do we have peace with God?olt only comes through Jesus Christ
- Do we work for peace on earth?
 - •We need to point others to the Prince of Peace
