Armor Up: Prayer

(Ephesians 6:18 & Various Texts)

Prayer as Warfare

- Prayer is given greater <u>prominence</u> within the context of the battle with the powers of darkness than any of the weapons listed in v. 14-17.
 - The call to prayer ties back to the original exhortation to stand firm
- Prayer is our line of <u>communication</u> with our Commander oWithout this constant <u>communication</u>, we don't know our orders (Col. 4:2)

Prayer as Primary

- We are urged to pray:
 - 0 At all times, because our struggle with the powers of darkness is never ending (1 Thess. 5:17)
 - o Inspired & guided by the Holy Spirit (Rom 8:26)
 - oWith all types of prayer
 - This includes praise, laments, thanksgiving, & supplication (Phil. 4:6)
 - Like the Psalms
 - OWith all perseverance, being alert and aware
 - So that we may overcome <u>fatigue</u> and <u>discouragement</u>, and not to fall into spiritual <u>sleep</u> or <u>complacency</u> (Mark 14:38)
 - oFor all the saints
 - Joining others in the spiritual battles they face (Jas 5:16)

Prayer as Submission

- In the imagery of battle, prayer is our lifeline
- <u>Obedience</u> in prayer is ultimately <u>submitting</u> ourselves to <u>God's</u> will oJust like <u>Jesus</u> (Luke 22:42)
- The most powerful prayer is not simply asking for God's will to be done oIt begins with the honest recognition that we may not want it
 - But that we want to want His will
- "I pray because I can't help myself. I pray because I'm helpless. I pray because the need flows out of me all the time, waking and sleeping. It doesn't change God. It changes me." -C.S. Lewis
