The Formation of the Gospels

How were the Gospels formed?

- The 4 Gospels were NOT written completely independent of each other
- There is a high degree of verbal similarity among Matthew, Mark, & Luke in their <u>narratives</u>

◦This would not be surprising in Jesus' <u>sayings</u>

◦But it would be highly unlikely if they were not from a common source since:

- 1. The stories were first told in <u>Aramaic</u>, yet the similarities are in their <u>Greek</u> form
- 2. Greek <u>word order</u> is extremely free, yet often the similarities extend even to <u>precise</u> word order
- 3. It is highly unlikely that 3 <u>people</u> in 3 different parts of the <u>Roman Empire</u> would tell the same story with the same words
 - Even to such minor points of individual style as prepositions and conjunctions

Example: The Feeding of the 5000

- Number of words used to tell the story:
 Matthew 14:15-21 = 157
 Mark 6:35-44 = 194
 Luke 9:12-17 = 153
 John 6:4-14 = 199
- Number of words common to *all* of the Synoptics: 53
- Number of words John has in common with the others: 8

 "Five; Two; Five thousand; Took loaves; Twelve baskets of Pieces"
- Percentage of Agreement
 Matthew w/Mark: 59%
 Matthew w/Luke: 44%
 Luke w/Mark: 40%
 John w/Mark: 40%
 John w/Mark: 8.5%
 John w/Luke: 6.5%

Conclusions

- Mark wrote <u>first</u>
- Matthew & Luke used <u>Mark's</u> gospel plus other <u>material</u> to which they both had access
- But probably did not have access to the writings of the other
- John wrote completely <u>independent</u> of the other 3 • Though probably was familiar at least with Mark, if not all the other Evangelists
