Psalms: Hermeneutics

Hermeneutical Observations

- Since Christians for generations have almost instinctively turned to the Psalter in times of need, perplexity, or joy
 - oThere is a hesitation to offer a 'hermeneutics of the psalms' lest they be stripped of their <u>emotional</u> impact
- Nevertheless, some observations are in order
 - OHopefully to make them still a greater joy to read, sing, and pray
- How do these words spoken to God function for us as a word from God?
 - OPrecisely in the ways they functioned for Israel in the first place
 - oAs <u>opportunities</u> to speak to God with the help of words He inspired others to use to speak to Him in times past

Basic Benefits of the Psalms

- 1. The psalms can serve as a guide to worship
 - The worshiper who seeks to praise God or to appeal to God or to remember God's benefits can use the psalms as a <u>formal</u> means of expression of his or her thoughts and feelings
 - A psalm is a carefully composed literary preservation of words designed to be <u>spoken</u>
 - When a psalm touches on a topic or a theme that we wish to express to the Lord, it can help us express our concerns despite our own lack of skill to find the right words
- 2. The psalms demonstrate to us how we can relate honestly to God
 - oThey do not so much provide doctrinal instruction as they give, by example, instruction in the godly <u>articulation</u> of even the strongest feelings
- 3. The psalms demonstrate the importance of <u>reflection</u> and <u>meditation</u> on that which God has done for us
 - They invite us to:
 - 0 Prayer
 - oMeditation: Controlled thinking on and discussion of God's Word
 - OReflect on fellowship with other believers
 - Such actions help shape in us a life of <u>purity</u> and <u>charity</u>
- 4. The psalms, like no other literature, lift us to a position where we can commune with God
 - Capturing a sense of the greatness of His kingdom and of what living with our heavenly Father for eternity will be like

A Caution

- The psalms do not guarantee a <u>pleasant</u> life
- It is an <u>over-literalization</u> of the language of the psalms to infer from some of them that God promises to make believers happy and their lives trouble-free
 - ODavid did not have this experience, despite his expression of God's blessing in the strongest terms
- The psalms, taken as a whole, remind us that God deserves praise for His greatness and goodness in spite of and in the midst of our misery
