Names of God: Elohim

What's in a Name?

- A name is not merely what we call someone to identify them
- Names connote meaning, relationships, & levels of intimacy
 - oExamples include:
 - Name changes: Jacob → Israel
 - Relational names: Father, mother, etc.
 - Nicknames & Pet names
- Some people believe that all religions are talking about the same God while using different names o'This is against everything the Bible teaches us
 - oIf God did not care what we called Him, <u>idolatry</u> would not be a sin (Ex 20:2-3; 23:13; Deut 4:7; 8:19)
- There are several names that God says we should call Him that reflect:
 - oHis character
 - Our relationship with Him
 - OHis intimacy with us

Elohim

- Elohim is actually a plural noun
 - oIt can refer to <u>foreign/false gods</u> (Ex 12:12)
 - OHowever, when it is used to refer to the God of Israel, it always uses <u>singular</u> verbs, adjectives, nouns and pronouns
 - This is called a plural of <u>majesty</u>
 - Much like the <u>royal</u> "we" (Ps 46:1)

El Shaddai

- The simple form El is often coupled with other words to describe the character of God like in El Shaddai
 - oThe patriarchs referred to God with this title (Gen 17:1; 28:3; 35:11; 43:14; 48:3)
 - The shortened form *Shaddai* is used 30 times in <u>Job</u>, the oldest book of the Bible
 - It is often found in <u>poetry</u> (Gen 49:25; Num 24:4; Ps 68:15; 91:1; Isa 13:6; Joel 1:15)
- The meaning of Shaddai is possibly related to the Akkadian word for "mountain," implying strength & permanence
 - oThe LXX translates it as pantokrator (all-mighty)
 - o"God Almighty"
- Thus, calling God El Shaddai is a declaration of His strength & unchanging nature

Elohim & El Shaddai in the New Testament

- Jesus & the New Testament authors do not use these names for God directly because they are writing/speaking a different language
 - OHowever, they use their Greek equivalents
- $Elohim \rightarrow Theos \rightarrow God$
 - The plural essence is reflected in the <u>Trinity</u>

El Shaddai → Theos ho pantokrator
Used exclusively in Revelation to portray God as the <u>unchanging conqueror</u> (Rev 1:8; 4:8; 11:17; 15:3; 16:7, 14; 19:6, 15; 21:22)

So What?

- Though the world around us is uncertain, chaotic, and changing o *El Shaddai* is powerful, majestic, and unchanging!
- Do we trust Him?
