The Gospel of John: A Question of Authority

John 5:1-30

Healing at the Pool (v. 1-9a)

- Jesus returns to <u>Jerusalem</u> for one of the Jewish feasts
- Bethesda: "Pool of outpouring"
 - ONear the Sheep Gate (NE corner of the Old City)
 - o Ill & disabled people gathered there because they thought the pool had healing properties
- Jesus seeks out a man who has been impaired for <u>38</u> years, asking if he wants to be <u>healed</u> oThe man does not think that Jesus can <u>heal</u> him
 - At best, he thinks Jesus may be offering to get him to the pool
 - oWhat Jesus is showing is that He has come to offer something better than superstition
- Jesus commands the man to stand up & carry his mat home, instantly healing him

Sabbath Breaker? (v. 9b-18)

- When Jesus finds him later, He warns him that something worse (<u>final judgment</u>) will happen if he continues in his <u>sinful</u> lifestyle
 - o<u>Illness</u> is not always tied to <u>sin</u>, but in this case, it was
 - oThe reason Jesus chose him was to offer him more than just physical healing; it was to give him a chance at <u>repentance</u>
 - However, the man goes to tell the Jewish leaders who healed him instead
- OBecause it was the <u>Sabbath</u>, the Jewish leaders who saw him carrying his mat were <u>outraged</u> OAccording to them, he was "doing <u>work</u>" on the <u>Sabbath</u>
 - The Scriptures define 'work' as one's regular employment
 - Rabbinic tradition had <u>39</u> categories that made up 'work', including <u>carrying</u> things from one *domain* to another (Mishnah, *Shabbath* 7:2; 10:5)
 - He was breaking their man-made rules
- He blames the man who healed him to avoid trouble with the leaders
 - OHe doesn't even know who Jesus is yet
 - This shows that the purpose of this sign is more <u>significant</u> than just this man
- When the Jewish leadership questions Jesus about His Sabbath activities, He claims that he is only doing what His <u>Father</u> does
 - OJesus claims that God never ceases from His work, and thus neither does He
 - Rabbis taught that God does not break Sabbath because the whole universe is His domain
 - oThey understood that Jesus was claiming to be equal to God, so they were plotting to kill Him

Authority to Judge (v. 19-30)

- Jesus clarifies that all His actions are done because He is <u>emulating</u> the work of His Father oTo give <u>life</u>
 - oTo <u>judge</u>
 - Which the Father has <u>entrusted</u> to the Son
- Because Jesus is both fully God & fully human, He is perfectly suited to act as our:
 - o <u>Judge-Advocate</u>: The one who understands our struggles & judges us
 - OHigh Priest: Representative between God & humanity
 - OSacrifice: The one who dies in our place & can offer us eternal life

- Jesus will act as humanity's <u>judge</u> whether we choose Him or not oBut if we do put our <u>trust/faith</u> in Him, the judgment goes against <u>Jesus</u>' record, not ours oHe takes the <u>punishment</u> our sins deserve (mercy) & gives us <u>eternal life</u> (<u>grace</u>)
- Even in His divinity/equality to God, Jesus is <u>reliant</u> on His <u>Father</u> (v. 30) • This is true of the <u>Holy Spirit</u> also (16:13-15) • Tri-unity = <u>Trinity</u>

So What?

- What things do we put our faith in other than Jesus?
- Jesus will judge the world. Have we trusted Him to take our punishment and grant us eternal life?
