Acts: Luke's Purpose

The Question of Purpose

- In order to understand the original meaning of Acts, we have to ask what Luke's intended purpose was
 - The heart of good <u>exegesis</u>

1. The Movement of the Gospel

- Luke's interest seems to be in the Spirit-guided movement of the Gospel:
 - o From <u>Jerusalem</u>-based, <u>Jewish</u>-oriented
 - o To Worldwide, Gentile-predominant
- Thus once the primary advocate of Gentile conversion (<u>Paul</u>) arrives at the capital of the Gentile world (<u>Rome</u>), Luke's work concludes
- Thus any statement of purpose that does not include the <u>Gentile</u> mission and the <u>Holy Spirit's</u> role misses the point of Acts

2. Luke's Omissions

What Luke leaves out of his work also speaks to his purpose

- He is NOT telling the biographies of the Apostles
- He is NOT very interested in church organization or polity
- He is NOT telling about every geographic expansion of the Church
 - o But rather focuses on the movement from Jerusalem to Rome
 - Thus, we can surmise that Luke's purpose is NOT in an exhaustive record of early Church history

3. NOT Standardization

- He records events as they happened, even when the order or form is inconsistent
 - Ex. The giving of the Spirit and Water Baptism; Communal life among the Jews vs. Gentiles
- Thus we can surmise that Luke's intent is NOT to set a model of Christian experience or Church life
 - NOT <u>Historical</u> <u>Precedent</u>

4. But Acts is a Model

- Despite the fact that Luke's purpose in Acts is not to serve as a model for specific behavior
- It does serve as a model in a greater sense
- It is a model of the fact that the life-changing work of the Gospel is the work of the Holy Spirit
 - A truth which ought to be repeated for the Church throughout all times and in all places
- "And precisely because this is God's intent for the church, nothing can hinder it, neither Sanhedrin nor synagogue, dissension nor narrow-mindedness, prison nor plot." p. 119
- Thus, Luke's purpose in Acts includes an intention for the ongoing church to be 'like' the early church
 - o By proclaiming the Gospel to the entire world
 - Not by necessarily modeling any of its <u>specific</u> examples
