Acts: Fond Farewells

(Acts 20:13-38)

Gathering Together (v. 13-17)

- Paul and company sail from <u>Troas</u> to <u>Miletus</u>, making several stops along the way
- Each leg of the journey represented one daylight period, with the crew putting into port each night
 - oThis was due to the rocky coasts, making night sailing dangerous
- Paul sends for the <u>elders</u> from the Ephesian church to meet him in Miletus, about 30 miles south of the city

Recalling the Past (v. 18-21)

- Once the Ephesian elders arrive, Paul speaks to them at length oIt is his <u>farewell</u> address to these brothers in Christ
- He begins by focusing on his ministry history with them
- He reflects on the three characteristics of his ministry, which he claims should be emulated:
 - o <u>Humility</u> (Phil 2:3; Col 3:12; Eph 4:2)
 - Openness of his proclamation
 - He held nothing about the Gospel back
 - o Inclusiveness of his witness
 - He shared the Gospel with anyone willing to listen

Facing the Future (v. 22-27)

- Paul then looks forward to what is ahead of him oHe knows that God is sending him to <u>Jerusalem</u> and that <u>hardships</u> are ahead
- Paul's focuses on finishing his ministry & life well
 - o"Finishing the race": The goal being witnessing to the truth of who Jesus is to very end
 - Which he would do
- He then clearly states that he knows this is the <u>last</u> time he will see these dear brothers on this side of eternity

Words of Instruction (v. 28-35)

- Paul gives the Ephesians elders words of both encouragement & warning
- They are to take their roles as <u>shepherds</u> of God's people seriously oStarting with their own lives
- And warns them of <u>false</u> <u>teachers</u> that will rise up oSome from their own midst
- He finishes with a reflection on material goods
 - OAgain, pointing to his personal example
 - OHe encourages his brothers to be known for what they give, not what they take
 - A characteristic that he states is essential for Christian <u>leaders</u> (1 Tim 3:3, 8; Tts 1:7, 11)
 - OAnd he quotes Jesus Himself as evidence: "It is more blessed to give than to receive."
 - Though we do not have this expression verbatim elsewhere, it is reflected in Jesus' teachings, especially in Luke's Gospel (Luke 6:30, 38; 11:41; 12:33; 18:22)

Parting Ways (v. 36-38)

- After Paul finished speaking, he <u>embraced</u> his brothers and <u>wept</u> with them oA reflection of their deep <u>love</u> for one another
- Then he got back on the <u>boat</u> to finish his voyage to Jerusalem
