Ecclesiastes: The Work of God

Ecclesiastes 7 & 8

Sources of Wisdom (7:1-14)

- Wisdom is gained:
 - OBy confronting our mortality (v. 1-4)
 - More insight is gained through <u>suffering</u> than <u>pleasure</u>
 - oFrom good correction (v. 5-7)
 - Rather than from empty platitudes
 - oThrough patience
 - Not taking <u>short-cuts</u>, like oppression & bribery (. 7)
 - Having a <u>long-term</u> view of things (v. 8)
 - Thinking through the <u>outcome</u> from the <u>onset</u>
 - Being slow to <u>anger</u> (v. 9)
 - Not being *stuck* in the <u>past</u> (. 10)
 - Because it does not help us see God's work in the present
- Wisdom is of great benefit (v. 12-14)
 - OBecause it shelters us in times of trouble
 - oIt increases during hardships
 - oIt reminds us that God is in control
 - God uses both prosperity & hardships to teach us lessons

The Search for Virtue (7:14-29)

- The term 'righteous' here refers to a self-righteousness based on our actions
 - ORather than in a right-standing granted by God's grace
 - OInstead, one should learn to fear God, which leads to true righteousness
- Some wickedness is inevitable in life, but it should never be pursued
 - This is because we are sinful by nature & choice
 - We are <u>scheming</u> and <u>deceptive</u>
 - Which affects our <u>relationships</u>
 - oWhen we admit this, it also allows us to be honest about our own <u>failings</u> & fragile <u>egos</u>, so God can deal with sin in us (v. 21-22)

God's Unseen Work (8:1-17)

- We are called to <u>obey</u> those in positions of <u>authority</u> because they have been placed there by <u>God</u> (see Rom. 13:1-5; 1 Pet. 2:13-15)
 - oThough not when they are in opposition to God's explicit commands (See Ex. 1:17-21; Josh.
 - 2:1-7; 1 Sam. 14:45; 1 Kings 18; Dan. 3; 6; Acts 4:19-21; 5:29; Rev. 13:15)
 - oWhen they are in the wrong, we must be <u>tactful</u> and <u>diplomatic</u> (v. 3-4)
 - OAnd remember that human power is <u>limited</u> and <u>fleeting</u> (v. 6-9)
 - 0 And ultimately God will end the reign of tyrannical and self-righteous rulers (v. 10a)
- Ultimately, justice will be executed by God (v. 10a-15)
 - oThough it is sometimes <u>delayed</u>
 - OAnd sometimes the righteous <u>suffer</u> & the wicked <u>prosper</u>
- This view can lead to an enjoyment of one's life now, even amid injustice (v. 15)

So What?

- Does our righteousness come from our work or God's?
- Do we trust Him to work in the world around us, even when we don't understand?
