Immanuel: The Gift of Joy

Isaiah 11:1-10

The Setting (Isa 10)

- Isaiah is telling Judah not to fear the <u>Assyrian</u> empire oFor God will raise up another power to judge them
- This <u>cycle</u> is part of God's plan • But the day is coming when the cycle will end

Hope (11:1-5)

- God will raise up a king from the line of <u>David</u> oJesse was the father of <u>David</u>
- "Shoot from a stump"
 Like a tree that has been chopped down, yet it continues to grow
 This implies that the David kingship will *seem <u>destroyed</u>*
- He will reign:
 - oBy God's Spirit (John 1:32)

• Who is described as giving <u>wisdom</u> & <u>understanding</u> (Luke 2:40, 47; cf. Col 1:9) • With justice for the poor (Luke 4:17-20; quoting Isa 61:1-2)

Peace (v. 6-8)

- This king will bring about peace oNot just among the <u>nations</u> oBut throughout all of <u>creation</u>
- And He will come as a <u>child</u> (v. 6b)

Joy (v. 9-10)

- This coming peace means current <u>joy</u> for God's people • This is an <u>eschatological</u> picture of Jesus' work
- Joy: Looking beyond our current circumstances to God's promises in Jesus
- This assurance comes from <u>knowledge</u> of the LORD (v. 7b) • Knowledge: <u>Relationship</u> with God

So What?

- Jesus is God's gift of joy
- When we have a relationship with Him:
 OWe have *hope* rooted in the past
 OBecause we have *peace* in the present
 OAnd we look forward with *joy* to the future where He will right every wrong
- He is Immanuel, God with us
