# ACTS: Jail Break

#### Acts 12:1-25

## Herod's Rage (v. 1-5)

- Herod <u>Agrippa</u> I (10 B.C.–A.D. 44)
   Grandson of Herod the Great (Luke 1:5)
   Nephew of Herod the Tetrarch (Luke 3:19; 13:31; 23:7–12
   He had recently returned from Rome to rule
   He was a pious <u>Jew</u> and a ruthless suppressor of <u>minorities</u> when they became disruptive
- He saw followers of Jesus as a <u>threat</u>
  - $\odot \text{So,}$  he targeted the <code>leadership</code> of the Church
    - Killing <u>James</u>, John's brother
    - Imprisoning <u>Peter</u>
      - Intending to kill him after the Passover feast had ended
        - $\circ~$  This led the Church to fervent prayer

### The Jail Break (v. 6-17)

- God sends an angel to <u>deliver</u> Peter from Herod (v. 6-11)
- Peter then seeks out the Church gathered at John Mark's mother's house
- They are in prayer for Peter and do not believe the servant girl's report that he is there • They conclude that rather than God answering their <u>prayers</u>, it must be an <u>angel</u>
- When they learn the truth, they are <u>amazed</u>
- Peter recounts his story and then gives instructions to share it with the rest of the <u>Church</u> and its <u>leadership</u>

## Herod's Fate (v. 18-25)

- When Herod learned of Peter's escape, he was livid and put the guards to <u>death</u> (v. 18-19)
- As he was dealing with ruling, Herod is overcome with <u>pride</u>

   This led the Lord to strike him <u>dead</u>
   Thus, his <u>kingdom</u> and <u>rule</u> was thwarted
- Meanwhile, the <u>Kingdom</u> of <u>God</u> increased despite Herod's efforts (v. 24)
   And the stage is set for the Gospel to continue to spread through the ministry of Barnabus, Saul\*, & John Mark

## So What?

• Man cannot thwart the plans of God

- God uses human rulers to advance His kingdom in ways that we cannot always see or understand
- God answers prayer, sometimes while we are still asking
